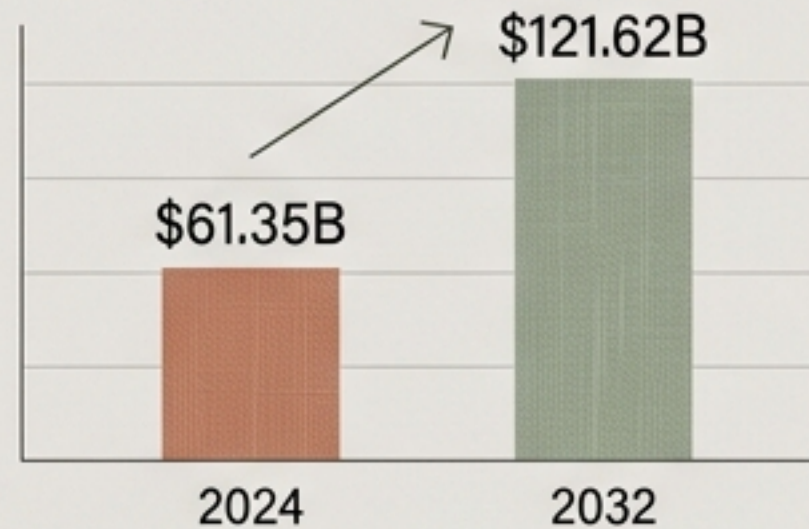

- Over 90% of surveyed homeowners plan to move forward with 2026 renovations, fueled by high home equity, aging housing stock, and customization desires.
- 54% fund these projects via home equity.

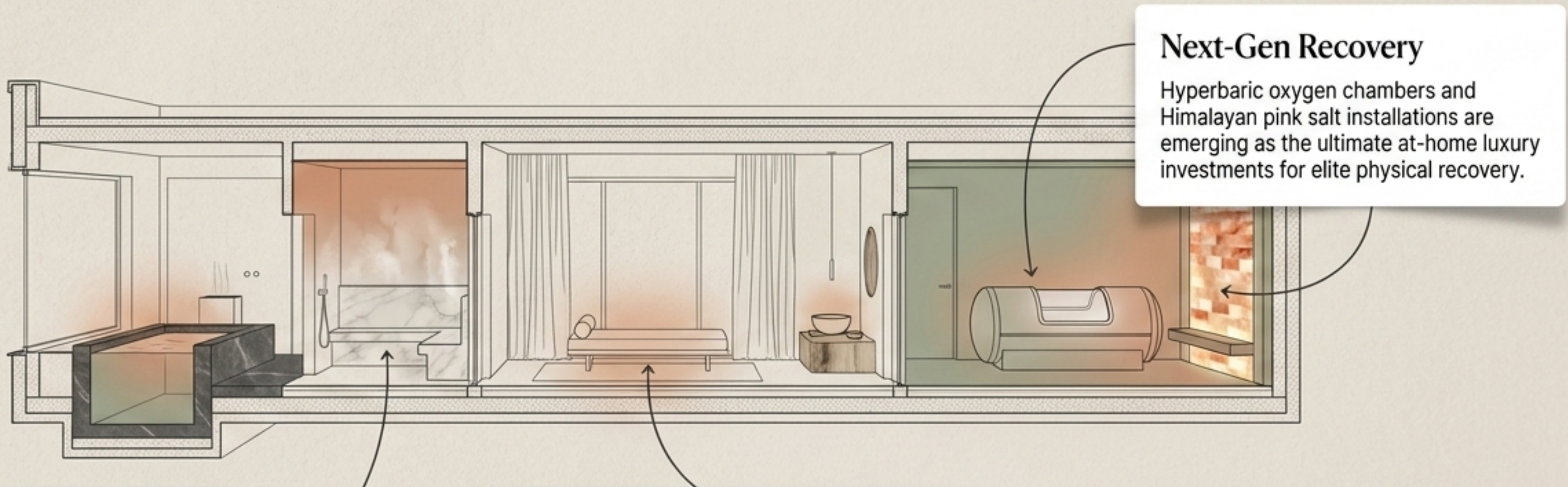
Generation X

Gen X luxury homeownership jumped 10% over the last five years—the highest increase of any age group. They represent the peak of market liquidity and are matching or exceeding Baby Boomer median renovation spend (\$25,000 baseline).

Hyperbaric oxygen chambers and Himalayan pink salt installations are emerging as the ultimate at-home luxury investments for elite physical recovery.

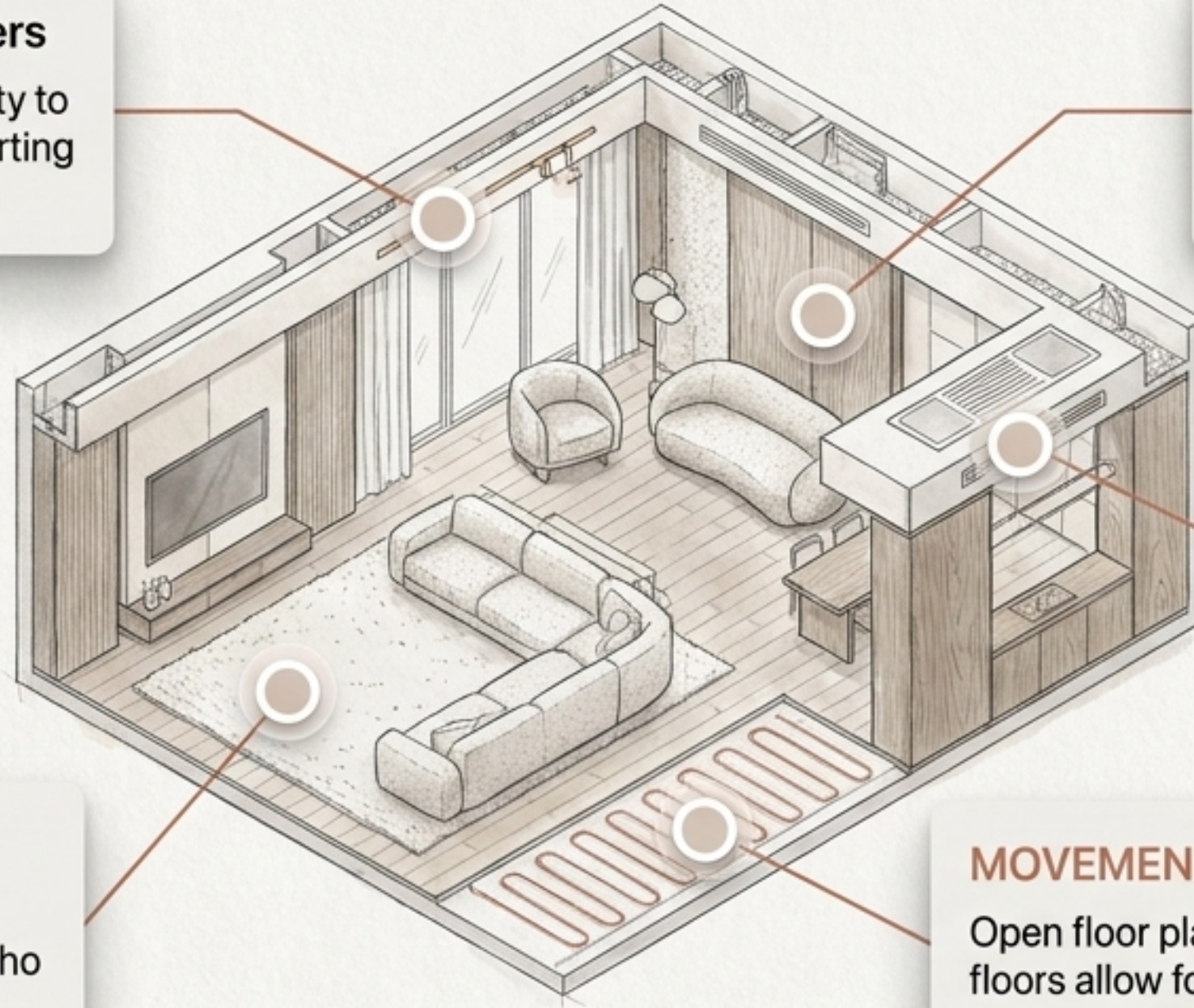
Immersive environments require multi-sensory engineering

SIGHT: Circadian Lighting Layers

Smart systems shift tone and intensity to match natural daylight cycles, supporting sleep and focus without harsh glare.

TOUCH: Tactile Variation

The strategic use of nubby boucle, raw wood grain, and velvet to provide grounding, physical feedback.



SMELL: Scent Zoning

Integrated diffusers create distinct atmospheric zones—citrus in kitchens for energy, lavender in bedrooms for calm.

SOUND: Acoustic Control

Wool-blend rugs, hidden acoustic panels, and cork flooring absorb echo to create deep, calming quiet.

MOVEMENT: Intuitive Flow

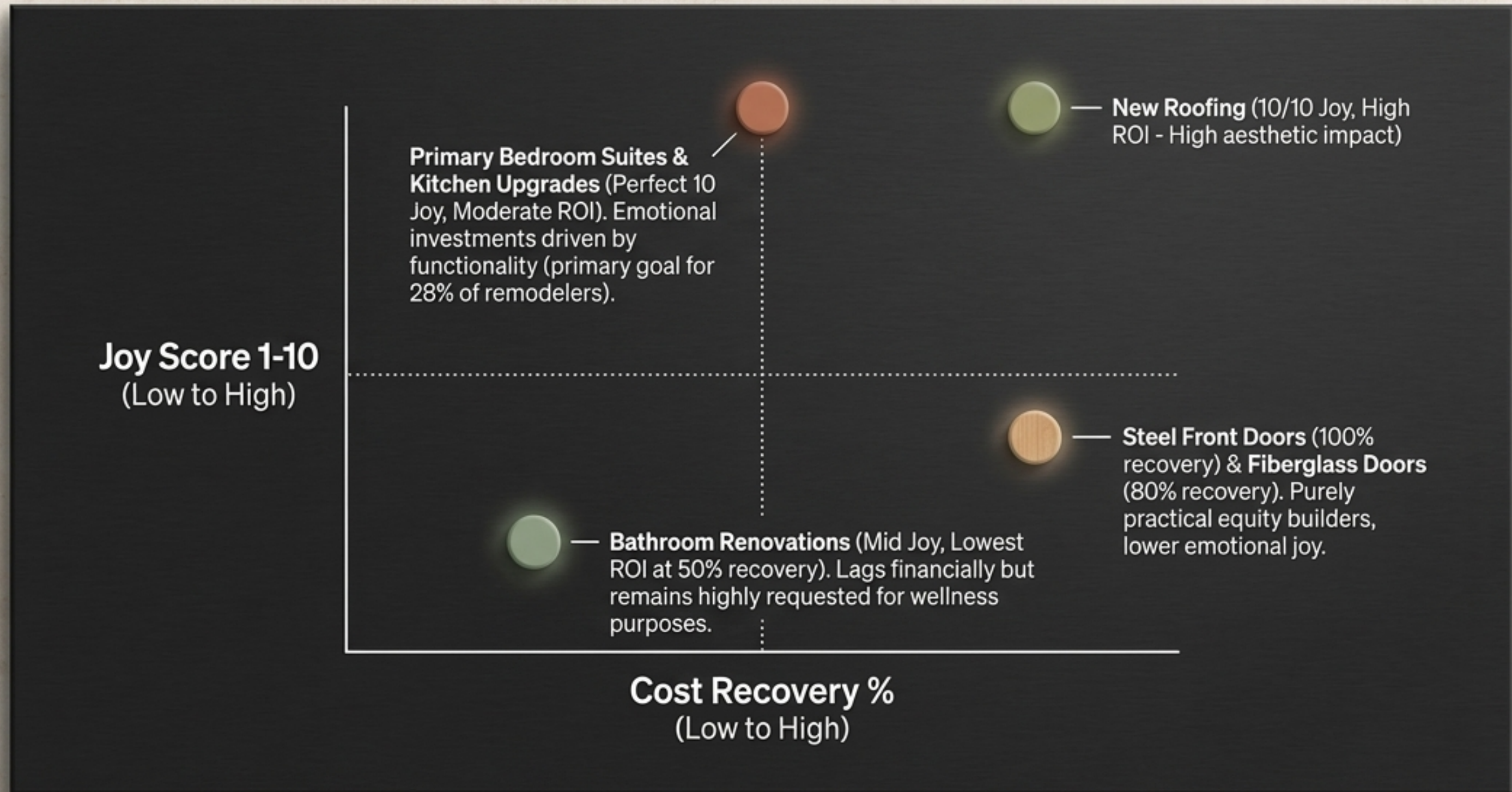
Open floor plans and radiant heated floors allow for frictionless, comfortable movement through the space.
